

Benefits of studying in the US

Academic Excellence

While studying at their community college and post-transfer, students may have opportunities to study and conduct research with leading thinkers in a number of disciplines, including but not limited to, social sciences, business and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) fields.

Diverse Educational Opportunities

The United States is home to over four thousand colleges and universities. Some US colleges and universities stress broad educational principles; others emphasize practical, employment-related skills; many specialize in the arts, social sciences, or technical fields.

Cutting-Edge Technology

US higher education institutions have a number of cutting-edge technology resources to help students succeed. Tech-assisted solutions include digital library resources, online learning management systems, and online tuition payment systems. Some institutions also offer access to lab space and research equipment to help students gain valuable hands-on experience.

Leadership and Research Opportunities

While studying at their community college and post-transfer, international students have a number of leadership and research opportunities available to them. Our international students have served as leaders on their Student Council and as Residential Assistants and Peer Mentors. International students may also take advantage of research opportunities available at some community colleges and 4-year institutions.

Major Variety

Most US-based college students will focus a majority of their first two years of coursework on general education courses. General education courses are designed to help students further develop their critical thinking abilities and

communications skills as well as their competencies as emerging global leaders. Taking a majority of general education courses along with a few major-related courses during one's two years in community college is a great investment for international students. Indeed, state regulations and most transfer agreements focus on the transfer of general education credits across public and private institutions in the United States.









Campus Life Experience

When international students study in the US, they are making a choice to broaden not only their educational opportunities, but their cultural experience as well. Whether it's college in a small town or a university in the middle of the city, most schools offer a variety of student clubs and organizations to meet students' interests. Joining different organizations and associations enables students to immerse themselves in American culture, meet new people, and make new friends.

Time studying abroad can be enhanced by participating in the social and cultural scene. US campuses offer a rich variety of academic, cultural, and athletic activities meant to enrich one's life.

The international study experience can help develop self-confidence, independence, and cross-cultural skills—all desirable attributes to employers worldwide.

Job Opportunities

Of the 11.6 million jobs created after America's Great Recession, 8.4 million went to those with at least a bachelor's degree, according to a report from the Center on Education and the Workforce at Georgetown University.

International students have the unique opportunity to work in their field of study in the United States after they graduate with their bachelor's degree. Students studying in the STEM fields can potentially work for three years after graduating.*



2-year colleges can help students improve English skills, save money, and adapt to US education.

This is why more international students study in the US than in any other country. The US remains the source of many of the world's ground-breaking developments in technology, business, arts, and beyond.

US schools typically offer numerous extracurricular activities that provide real-world job experience. This could include working for the school library, becoming a teacher's assistant, tutoring other students, and more. The idea is to provide practical experience to build on what is taught in class. This becomes invaluable when interviewing for a job.

Most US institutions have a career services department staffed with professionals focused on helping students with their resume, interview skills, and finding job opportunities, both during and after their studies.

How does transferring work? Why transfer?

When it comes to education, students are encouraged to dream big. The American Honors and American Success programs at select 2-year colleges help prepare students to transfer and succeed at a US university.

The Transfer Process: Start at a 2-Year College, Transfer to a US University

What it is: International students studying at a 2-year college develop and practice the skills necessary to succeed at a US university, while also building a foundation for career success.

How it works: Students attend a community college to earn an associate degree, then transfer to a university to earn their bachelor's degree.

What you get: An associate degree and a bachelor's degree.



Save on Tuition

US 2-year colleges offer international students the ability to pursue their studies in the United States at a lower cost, often with the added bonus of an easier transition to US-style academics. Students can then transfer to a university to complete their bachelor's degree.

General Education: What Is It?

A vast majority of US-based higher education institutions require students to complete general education courses to earn their US bachelor's degree. General education courses are designed to help students further refine their analytical, critical thinking, and communications skills, as well as develop as emerging global leaders. To sharpen their analytical and critical thinking skills, students generally have to take math classes and or philosophy courses. To develop their persuasive communications abilities, students might be required to take English composition courses, and in some cases, foreign language courses. Finally, to help students emerge as effective community and global leaders, many US-based institutions require general education courses in history, sociology, anthropology, political sciences, or international relations.

The Purpose of General Education Courses

Colleges have several reasons for requiring general education courses. Required courses ensure that every college graduate has the same basic set of tools and knowledge. Colleges want students to graduate with strong analytical and writing skills, plus a basic understanding of modern society. General Education courses ensure that chemistry majors can communicate via writing and English majors understand the scientific method. Many students discover a hidden passion for a field of study as a result of taking a Gen Ed course.

Is There Any Flexibility With General Education Courses?

During their time at their community college, students might have different options to fulfill their general education requirements. For example, to fulfill their general requirements, business students might be able to take a business math course, an English writing course as well as an international politics

course, while a history student might be able to take an algebra course along with a writing history course and a history of American civil rights course to fulfill their general education requirements. About 80% of courses in community college will be general education, with the rest focused on specific major-related courses. This is designed so a student can focus most of their community college education on exploring the complex relationships between disciplines before focusing their post-transfer courses on specialized courses in their major of interest.

Can You Transfer General Education Courses?

One big advantage of general education courses is how likely they are to transfer from a 2-year college to a university. Math is math, no matter where it's taught. If students want to switch between schools, they likely won't have to repeat courses at their new university. Many states even mandate that their in-state universities accept Gen Ed course credits completed at an in-state 2-year college.

Many professors, knowing that their course may be the only experience students have in that particular academic field, will do their best to make classes engaging while ensuring students learn. Students might analyze movies, read interesting case studies, or be asked to consider how the class can be applied to their own area of study.



Taking General Education Courses with American Honors and American Success

In the American Honors or American Success programs, students will take general education courses as well as leadership seminars and transfer workshops. These learning opportunities help ensure that students graduate with the academic skills necessary to succeed after transferring to a leading university to complete their bachelor's degree.





American Success is a two-year college program where students earn an associate degree and work one-on-one with an advisor to transfer to a US university for their junior and senior years to complete a bachelor's degree.



American Honors is a two-year college honors program where students earn an associate degree and engage in rigorous leadership and career activities to enahnce their chances to transfer to a leading US university for their junior and senior years to complete a bachelor's degree.

American Honors also offers a High School Completion track. Students 16 or 17 years old who are academically strong would apply to the American Honors High School Completion Program, only available at Community Colleges of Spokane (see page 42). To be eligible, applicants must have less than two years remaining to complete their secondary schooling.

The Transfer Process

Students get complete support and one-on-one advising sessions to ensure a smooth transfer process. From enrollment through transfer, students get personal guidance on every part of the process: making a degree plan, selecting courses, selecting a school, and applying for financial aid and scholarships. Students are coached through a five-step process to help them transfer.

1. Select classes likely to transfer.

Work with your advisor to select classes, a major, and degree pathway that are both interesting and likely to transfer.

2. Perform well academically and as a leader.

Demonstrate strong performance and growth both academically and outside the classroom. Get involved in a club, sport, or activity that is meaningful to you. Seek out leadership positions. Continue to earn high grades and work closely with your professors. Consider whom you might ask for a letter or recommendation in the fall of your second year.

3. Research schools and apply.

Students have access to the 2-year college's transfer network and benefits. Advisors will help students select schools to apply to both within and outside of the college's network. Additionally, American Honors students enjoy access to the benefits of the national transfer network.

4. Receive admissions decisions and credit evaluation results.

Receive an admissions decision from schools where you applied. Carefully review credit evaluations of the university admissions offices and academic departments.

5. Evaluate offer packages, select a university, and enroll.

Evaluate options, taking into account financial aid packages and degree audit reports. Search for outside scholarships through Phi Theta Kappa, FastWeb, CollegeFish, and local sites. Accept an offer of admission and arrange housing at your transfer school if necessary. Send final grades/transcripts to your university of choice.



Complete Enrollment Steps

From I-20 issuance to arrival on campus



The Admissions Officer will inform the student of the specific documents needed to process and obtain an **I-20 form**, that will be issued by the 2-year college.

Additionally, students will need to **submit payment** for some college-specific fees.

Once all documentation is received to process the I-20, students will receive a **SEVIS number** and an **I-20 tracking number** from the Admissions Officer.

Students will use the SEVIS number to schedule and confirm a **visa appointment**.

The Admissions Officer will provide the student with detailed **pre-arrival instructions** that will guide them through the process of obtaining a US visa, securing housing, traveling to the US, and an overview of what to expect upon arrival.
